



Bayindeen fire recovery - Council focuses on safety and support

Pyrenees Shire Council is leading fire recovery efforts, helping communities clean up and recover from the massive Bayindeen fires in late February.

Council started recovery work as soon as it was safe, providing support and information and undertaking necessary work to ensure the community's safety. Council is also lobbying state and federal governments for essential disaster funding to ensure the financial viability of recovery work.

Council officers have been working on:

- Tree removal along roadsides to ensure safety.
- Assessing roads and infrastructure for damage.
- Visiting local businesses to provide support.
- Holding outreach sessions for residents to access information and support services.
- Working with the community to ensure water used by the CFA for the fires is replenished.
- Connecting residents with organisations for fence replacement, clean-ups and other support.
- Conducting assessments and producing reports to secure state and federal government funding.

There is much more work to do, and Council is committed to helping rebuild

infrastructure in fire-affected areas and supporting residents to recover well. If you've been impacted by the fire, we encourage you to get in touch with us to register your details – please don't hesitate to seek help.

Some of the recovery support available from local organisations and governments includes:

- · Financial disaster recovery payment.
- Help on your property refilling dams and tanks, rebuilding fences, finding feed for your stock.

Will you stand for Council this October?

Could you be one of Pyrenees Shire Council's newly elected councillors this year?

Council elections will be held across Victoria in October and Pyrenees Shire Council is encouraging interested residents to find out more about becoming an elected councillor.

Council is taking part in the Municipal Association of Victoria's (MAV) Stand for Council campaign, which educates community members about the roles and responsibilities of becoming a councillor.

The campaign is built on the premise that a strong, healthy, inclusive democracy is fostered through a diverse mix of elected representatives with differing skills, experience and views.

Prospective local candidates will be able to attend information sessions in Beaufort and Avoca (dates to be confirmed) or one that will be held on Thursday 8 August at the Ballarat Town Hall.

Pyrenees Shire Council Mayor Cr Robert Vance said being an elected representative is a rewarding and fulfilling role.

Cr Vance was first elected to the then-Avoca Shire Council in 1987. He joined the Pyrenees Shire Council post amalgamations in 1996 until 2002, being re-elected in 2008, 2012, 2016 and 2020.

"As a Councillor, you make a real difference in the community at a grassroots level," he said.

"Your local council is the government tier closest to the people and it's a very rewarding job, allowing you to give back to the community you live in. I encourage any interested Pyrenees residents to find out more about becoming a councillor and consider standing at this October's election."

Cricket nets

Three brand-new cricket practice nets (above) and a storage shed for local clubs were opened in early February. The new facilities provide a better practice surface, improving safety for users. The facility was funded with a grant from the Victorian Government, and contributions from Pyrenees Shire Council, Beaufort Community Bank, the Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund the Beaufort Cricket Club.

Lake path upgrades

Completed last year, upgrades to the paths around Lake Beaufort included safety upgrades and replacing and repairing infrastructure



such as paths, drainage and footbridges. This work encourages greater use of the area, supporting tourism and community health and wellbeing.

Beaufort Lake foreshore barbecue shelter

A multi-purpose shelter (above) has opened, providing a community gathering space in a picturesque setting. The shelter includes a public barbecue and performance space, and is designed to have minimal impact on the view from the nearby community centre.

Oval lights and power upgrade

At the time this newsletter went to print, work on this project was nearing completion. New lights for evening training had been installed and an infrastructure upgrade to power the new lights completed. The final part of the work is to align the lights' beams on to the oval's playing surface, which was due to be completed during April.
