Discover what's on offer at Council's resource centres

Have you been to your local resource centre lately? Perhaps you've dropped by to view a local exhibition, or use a computer or pick up a book or a DVD.

Council has two resource centres, one in Beaufort on Neill Street and one in Avoca on High Street.

The centres are staffed by the Frontline Services Team, who also work in the Lawrence Street Council office. You can pay rates or handle other council transactions at both centres.

Are you also aware you can go to the centres to deal with Services Australia; Medicare and Centrelink? Staff can help you with using the system or the phone. Avoca is an Access Point and Beaufort is an Agent.

Avoca is being redeveloped to house the new Digital Hub, a new co-working space with NBN, video conferencing and dedicated work and training spaces. These facilities are expected to be open to the public in late-June, all going well.

Both centres have public access computers, free wi-fi and you can use printers and photocopiers.

The Pyrenees Libraries are part of the Central Highlands Libraries so residents can access the whole catalogue. The collection available is not just limited to books, but includes magazines, DVDs, audio books and newspapers.

Storytime for the young and young at heart is held fortnightly on a Friday in Avoca, and weekly in conjunction with the Supported Playgroup in Beaufort.

Centre staff can help residents with accessing My Aged Care to support them in independent living. The My Aged Care Federal system is the starting point for older residents looking for support options. Once you've completed a My Aged Care referral, if you are eligible for services, you'll be contacted by the Pyrenees Shire

Council Regional Assessment Service for a Home Support Assessment.

Both centres are also drop off points for e-waste. You can take your batteries, old mobile phones or laptops to be recycled. (Bigger electronic items need to go to Transfer Stations.)

The centres are open seven days a week, 10am-5pm Monday to Friday and 10-1pm on the weekends.

My Aged Care the starting point for help at home

Beaufort Cricket Nets project progressing

Progress is being made on the new cricket nets at the Goldfields Recreation Reserve. A building contractor has now been appointed and the detailed and engineering designs are near completion. Council hopes that on ground works will not be slowed down by wet winter weather and plans to keep the project moving as quickly as weather will permit.

The project will deliver a fully enclosed three-wicket cricket practice net facility and storage shed which will include a separate storage section for the Beaufort Little Athletics Club.

The total project is valued at \$274,479.04 and it is funded by the Victoria Government, Cricket Victoria, the Beaufort Cricket Club and Pyrenees Shire Council.

Blokes Day Out is a great day to join the fellas in your area at the local pub every second Tuesday of the month for a chance to get together for a meal and chat about things that men like to talk about. The group meets from 12pm to 2.30pm, with lunch covered for up to \$15.

The monthly community meal is a great place to meet other members of your community. Our support staff serves a fully catered meal on the last Thursday of each month at Beaufort Community Centre in Pratt Street from 12pm to 2pm. Do you want more of a say in the programs our Community Care team runs? Do you have ideas for other programs the team can look at running? The Pyrenees Community Care team want to invite you to be part of our Client Advisory Group. The group will be a time for clients to share how they feel about services we offer.

We are looking for people from all different cultural backgrounds to be included in the group. The group will meet throughout the year in Beaufort and Avoca. There are two meetings coming up this year in August and November.
